NTARY Chief activities of the past month: - SERVICE Helping Americans b) Preparations for and opening of Piers Plowman Club for War Workers.
c) New Blood Transfusion Drive and Hospital Sessions in connection. Transfer of Clothing Exchange to new Address. -> (Miss Fry) Transport. Camouflage Netting. General Remarks. Nearly all Office Staff is away and has been away ill or with general debility after illness. Work for large concentrations of Americans is very varied. Examples. 1. Settling in the new camps and seeing their officers about all we are able to do for them. 2. Putting them in touch with social services.
3. Providing 200 dance partners for a fortnightly dance, dressing the hall and supervising the dances.

4. Very large quantities of sewing by our Hospital Supply Depot.

5. Acting as general information bureau covering all the questions asked by strangers in a strange land.

6. Befriending them individually and in groups.

7. Making the women a sitting -room and welcoming them as members in our Rose Bank Services Club. 8. Finding hospitality. The officers and men often bring up pictures of their families to show us and we look through apparatus which makes the figures stand out and seem very real. We look right into the eyes of their wives and babies. These pictures are great treasures to the men and we feel honoured that they show them to us. The Americans are a very generous race. It embarrasses us when they come to a meal and bring so much more than we give. We are trying to arrange a meeting with their Service Officers over the formation of a British Welcome Club - but in Malvern they are already admitted to several W.V.S. Canteens, so the need is not so great. United Services Club. Our United Services Club is a year old. Its finances are too flourishing. We are giving a big birthday party so as to spend money on the members. Piers Plowman Club Our Piers Plowman Club has now been open a fortnight and already has about 700 - 800 members from transferred workers only. We think we may have to close at 1000, but it will depend upon the average attendance. Transport All drivers busy. Journeys for Hospital, M.O.W.M. M.O.H., W.V.S. Our Clothing Exchange continues to be a source of satisfaction to us An old woman pensioner was given a worn but still serviceable sealskin muff-purse and a tall, black straw hat with pretty trimming. Says she, "Oh! Mam, they're grand, and the neighbours will think I've been benighted by the King!" The Schedule to which we have been told to confine our reports does not answer our present work. It has a depressing effect for while remembering all one hasn't done under it, one forgets all the nice things one has done outside it. Our activities come under the heading 'miscellaneous' and it would be difficult to confine them to the paper. The Americans continue to be our chief activity (see last month) They are very nice people and suit us well. Blood Transfusion. This is a large activity here, because we

are 'letting' Government Missions.

Transport, which arranges about seven journeys a day, and

Camouflage Netting are others.

We look after three clubs and four canteens. The latest club has reached a membership ceiling of 1250 after only having been open just over a month. Our Forces Club is a delightful place. The members are so good and kind. We now need a district annexe for our Transferred Workers Club and also a British Welcome Club for a very large concentration of Americans. The American officers are very busy and they can not find time to come and discuss the latter question with us, but the use our canteens well . We have invited all the women members to join our Forces Club. 98 joined one afternoon from one of their units but this special unit is now leaving to be replaced by another.

The Centre Organiser hopes to do a better report next time.

That the Americans appreciate our help is shown by their many kindnesses to us. They have just given us about a \$000 splendid books which we have distributed to our Free Library, Clubs & Canteens, Sick Bay, Industrial Club Bedridden people, Children & others.

a) Blood Transfusion. We have over 1500 volunteers from Government Missions stationed here who have lately been organised for big "letting" sessions.

- b) Miscellaneous. Our VCP service to and from the hospitals is an important part of WVS work and is on a large scale.
- 9. Hospital Supplies. A large depot always at work and sending out thousands of things.
- 10. Transport. The VCP Service in Malvern is one of the largest in Worcestershire hospitals WVS lectures, collections, etc.
- 11. Mobile Squad. Five reported willing to be away over 12 hours and three for 12 hours.
- 12. Evacuees and Refugees from Abroad. They have either gone away or been absorbed into the labour market of the district where there is a dearth always.
- 13. Administration Centres & Information Bureaux. I never quite know what this means. We have arranged for WVS to be represented at our Information Bureau and act as liason.

MONTHLY NARRATIVE REPORT CENTRE Malvern Worcestershire 4th, May 1944 Though we are busy in them all, there has been no change in any service last month except that two courses of basic training and one refresher course have been completed, also we have completed the training of our Incidental Points volunteers. On May 9th, we are holding a Food Leaders' Conference in one day. The 1st Session beginning at 3 p.m. and the 2nd Session at 5 pm. with tea served in the interval. ARY We are doing all we can to start a "certain Club", the need being very great. There are premises in view but the owner wishes to let them as offices. Our hope is that the billeting officer will step in and prevent this and that we will be preferred to billetees! In spite of the fact that this is a closed area, a few evacuees continue to dribble in and we do our best for them. Four more hotels have been requisitioned, leaving only one (a large, expensive one) and taking still more of our volunteer force. Our "certain places" are doing well. A special memo has been sent to the County Office on our work for the members of a certain country. We are very busy preparing for 'Salute a certain person' week. Our County Organiser is organising the final Reception and Dance for the week. The following extracts are from letters received in this office. From a certain Source: "We wish to express our deepest gratifude toward you and your colleagues for the excellent cooperation and help you have given us". From the Ministry of Labour. Birmingham. " I understand that the day nursery filled up very well after you had distributed the posters. Thank you very much. From the Manager of the County Hotel. Malvern. (after the visit of important officials) "Thank you so much for your help in getting the W.V.S. ladies to help yesterday, I am most grateful to you and to them for their help, and hope that sometime I shall be able to return the compliment". WOMEN'S VOLUNTARY SERVICES FOR CIVIL DEFENCE

COUNTY Worcestershire CENTRE Malvern MONTH May. 1944

This report should describe the activities of the W.V.S. Centre during the month. Where W.V.S. members are assisting in activities outside the work of the Local Authority, the Authority or organisation responsible for such activities should be stated.

A list suggesting the subjects on which information would be most helpful will be issued from Headquarters from time to time.

BLOOD TRANSFUSION. (Miss Rankin) The clerical work, following the use of 350 Donors in T.R.E. in addition to the Routine Bleeds, has been heavy, but with the help of an extra typist, the records are now up to date. At the last routine session, on 26th. May, 48 donors were used at Malvern Link F.A.P. On 9th. June we are using 600 at A.D.R.D.E Sick Bay and Lansdowne Mobile Unit is standing ready to use large numbers of Donors at a few hours notice to supply the needs of the present emergency.

Miss Deakin is very pleased that the poster she designed for Malvern Salute the Soldier Week is being printed for use by the Ministry of Health.

TRANSPORT. (Miss Verini) A busy month. The usual routine work for Hospitals and Ministry of Food, etc. No outstanding calls.

CAMOUFLAGE NETTING. (Miss Verini) This Service is temporarily closed down.

HOUSEWIVES (Mrs. Robinson) A number of Housewives attended a Food Leader Meeting in the W.V.S. Office (Malvern), became interested in Food Leader matters and now wear Food Leader badges. Several Housewives attended a Basic Training One Day School on May 30th. There were also a number of volunteers for Emergency Help in Hospitals in the vicinity.

BASIC TRAINING. (Mrs. Murray Graham) A One Day School was held in a Malvern Lecture Hall. Visual Training was a predominant feature of the Basic Training programme, amusing playlets illustrated the talks on ARP and First Aid. 140 took this course, and, in the interval, much appreciated the Tea which was provided for them by a W.V.S. Mobile Van.

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SHOPPING SERVICE. (Mrs. Harrison) caters for the needs of the bed-ridden Hospital patients. From May 1st. to June 1st. we were able to purchase about 25 separate articles in response to individual requests from patients. Many of these requests are accompanied by detailed description of the required article and every attempt is made on the part of the "Shopper" to suit the personal taste of the invalid. Old English Silver, Pewter, China, particularly the well-known Worcester, Staffordshire, Chelsea as well as views and post-cards of English country scenes are in constant demand. A special order for London etchings we fulfilled by the kindness of a W.V.S. member who obtained them on a visit to London. Other Welfare work includes the sending of gifts to Hospitals, finding accommodation for representatives of the British Council, and Polish Art and Propaganda Exhibitions and helping with the organisatiin of the latter. CANTEENS & CLUBS (Mrs. Morshead) All as busy as usual.

MOBILE CANTEENS (Mrs. Whatley) In addition to our ordinary rounds, the Mobile Canteen did three interesting jobs in May. We went to Worcester on the occasion of Lady Reading's visit to the city and provided teas for the delegates at the Meeting. To Uptonwith tea and cakes for the Home Guard at a big display which they gave during the local Salute the Soldier Week. We also took the Mobile to the One Day School (Basic Training) in the Public Library Malvern and served tea to those in attendance, during the interval. REST CENTRES. (Mrs. Hallam) A successful practise was held at the Technical School and was well attended.

SOCK MENDING. Miss Arthur. With increased membership of our Services Club the mending Service is becoming more and more widely known and greater advantage taken of it. Organisation for this service has now been transferred to Rose Bank United Services Club.

REPORT

COUCY Wordestershire CHUTRE ... Malvern DATE .. June . 1944

(Dash) WELFARA FOR (Dash) ALLIES.

1. We have a Club at last and hope to open shortly. Gifts, offers of transport, offers to clean and colour wash are coming in nicely. There are two large rooms and four very nice smaller ones, also a kitchen, a bathroom, separate to liet and wash-basin. A box telephone is already installed.

- 2. A large number of Malvern women go down to the (dash) daily to help in a voluntary capacity they perform every kind of service.
- 3. We send quantities of flowers for the (dash) and we have received delightful letters of thanks.
- 4. We are planning excursions to take the (dash) to see the beauties of the district. Parties arranged for the next two weeks include Ledbury and Forest of Dean. Itineraries are drawn up in advance and these are made the subject of advance talks by the (dash-dash), so that the (dash) shall gain the most from their trips.
- 5. We have found a mension in the vicinity where nurses are received in parties of four to spend their 48 hrs. rest periods. Their hosts give them a wonderful time.
- 6. Two special excursions for 30 (dash and dash) have been planned to a country estate near Cradley for July 25th. and August 3th.
- 7. We have provided several thousand cigarettes for (dash in dash) Hospitals.
- 8. We continue to do all our previous services for them shopping, providing dance partners, information, hospitality, accommodation etc.

13 JUL 1944

ROYAL VOLUNTARY SERVICE GENERAL SOCIAL SERVICES. We have planted out selfevacuated evacuees who had come away from flying bombs, or
been blitzed by them. Seen to the provision of Wellington
for children. Provided a panel of over 20 workers ready
go on demand to a (dash) Hospital. Provided bridesmaids dresses
for a W.A.A.F. wedding. Sent a group down south who were
prepared to work with refugees. Found a temporary Mathematics
teacher for a Private School.

BLOOD TRANSFUEION (Miss Rankin) All volunteers are coming in steadily to enrol and we are getting a good waiting list. After 'D' Day there were Amergency calls for conors for casualties. A large group of w r workers valiantly rose to the occasion and produced twice as many donors as were needed. Another government organization was called upon a week later for Monors for casualties. On Friday last, a pathologist from Worcester Infirmary went to three factories in Malvern to test over 100 volunteers with a view to adding their names to the list in readiness for any other emergency.

TRANSPORT (Miss Verini) On the whole the demand for transport this month has been slightly less than usual. All drivers fully prepared for emergencies and keyed up ready to go on journeys at a moment's notice.

BASIC TRAINING (MRS.Murray Graham) A Basic Training One Day School in the form of a Public Meeting was held in the local Winter Gardens on June 26th. This Meeting was presided over by the Chairman of the Urban District Council. Members of the Civil Defence and Fire Guards as well as W.V.S. were present. The usual Basic Training programme was given, talks on A.R.P., Elementary Aid, Firefighting, etc., varied by Playlets and Sketches. The Audience numbered 150, of which 50 were W.V.S. who are now entitled to their Badges.

HOUSEWIVES (Mrs. Hugh Robinson) A number of Housewives a attended the large Basic Training Meeting on the 26th. as an opportunity to take a 'Refresher Course' in A.R.P. and Rirefighting.

CANTEENS (STATIC) Mrs. Morshead. Our static canteens have been as busy as usual.

CANTEENS (MOBILE) Mrs. Whatley. An average month, the ordinary routine, journeys being made. One large Civil Defence exercise was attended and refreshments served to those taking part in it.

ROSE BANK CLUB (Mrs. Morice) As well as providing an excellent Canteen and other amenities, this Club caters for the social needs of its members who now number over 700. Com erts are arranged frequently for their entertainment and recently an Exhibition of Needlework attracted much admiration. All the Exhibits were well insured as each one? was the work of an expert.

PIERS PLOWMAN INDUSTRIAL CLUB. This Club is going through teething troubles, but these will soon be at an end, now.

INCIDENT POINTS, SQUADS, MESSENGER SERVICE. The helpers in connection with these are in order and ready for work.

EMERGENCY FEEDING (Mrs. Murray Graham) A large exercise was held recently in which the new arrangements for cooking and serving were successfully tried out, and proved to be satisfactory.

FOOD LEADER & INFANT WELFARE (Miss Keble) we are endeavouring to foster a Child Welfare campaign. The local Food Of ice was interviewed with a view to various schemes being carried into effect. Food Flashes can not be shown here owing to lack of correct apparatus in the cinema.

HOSPITAL HELP SCHEME (Miss Keble) A scheme has been organised and we are ready to supply 300 helpers to a Hospital, if needed. in an Emergency.

MENDING SERVICE & KNITTING FOR WESTERN COMMAND. (Miss Arthur) Several baby garments have been made up from wool supplied by the Western Command Work Guild. The Mending and repair service for socks and clothing is still much appreciated and many take advantage of it.

MESTINGS Two large and successful one-day schools in Basic Training. Several inter-service meetings and an incident point training meeting. The Centre Organiser has attended Public Meetings and Committees of all sorts. Troops Welfare, Piers Plowman Club, Oetc.

At the request of the County Education Authority there has been a full stock-taking of rood and equipment and we have now handed over all keys, invoices etc. to Malvern Urban District Council. However a telephone message has come from the Council asking us to take back the care of the food stocks.

HOSPITAL SERVICES. BLOOD TRANSFUSION. A very quiet month. There has been no letting during this period.

National Savings. We have had a very successful special drive during this month - 'Arnhem'. Some of the Street Groups doubled their usual takings for that week. At one house where the collection is generally about £3. - £6 was the total for that week.

SOCIAL SERVICES This has been a busy worth; we well as our work for the five American Mospitals and their 12th Mospital centre, we have now settled in a small emergency hospital for the British Wounded.

a) The men are given free entrance to both our Clubs for the Morces and free food in one, also no charge is made to them for

b) We have provided regular V.C.P. Transport from our imergency Hospital to the parent hospital in Worcester; have produced the loan of two wheeled-chairs; given a spring cushion to one legless (a personal mift) taken the men a few trips; arranged hospitality to various large houses near; sent books, magazines, games, and put the hospital in touch with the donor of a pilliard table. We have also sent bundles of dressings, given digarettes and other small services and arranged for a mending service. We have supplied twenty walking sticks with rubber ends to fit. We have offered our Hadies in Green' visiting service and are in constant touch with the Matron who understands she may apply to us for anything and everything.

THE AMERICANS. Have been taken many lovely trips and received generous hospitality; they have also been taken a series of industrial trips but as special reports have been submitted for most of the above, no details are now given.

For one U.S.A. Hospital we have supplied a French Teacher for Nurses, French books, papers and French speaking visitors for French patients. At onother we have supplied a Russian Ballet Dancer, a Conjuror and a Pianist.

Most of the Hospitals now get their own dance partners, but for a special party and dance for wounded men, held monthly at the 93rd Hospital we continue to supply hand-picked partners.

Ne get many sudden calls for help - one Saturday afternoon ten girls had to be produced at once (not dancers) for a 'wounded' party, and a police uniform for a Lieutenant who wanted to be funny.

Flowers are sent regularly to all the Hospitals and our Hospital Supply Depot does an immense amount of work for them.

We answer a large number of questions and in the process of

finding the answers we learn quite a lot too!

The Reception and Dance for Officers and Murses organised by our County Organiser was a wonderful success. Only the lack of a Hall prevents her from organising a similar dance monthly.

We must recount that the Americans have been very generous to us. They send constant invitations which ales we are too bust to accept and they have given us fruit, sweets, and presents for our Stall at the Christmas Fair in aid of the Red Cross. At this Fair they are to have a stall of their own too. It is difficult to remember the myriad small services we perform for the Americans. We get great pleasure in the doing of them, and when our friends go away we shall be very sad indeed.

We have failed them in two requests. They want coloured absorbent papers for making Christmas Cards, and jackets for the members of their Jazz band to wear. Neither could we obtain.

canteen which was greatly enjoyed by both the factory workers
and their guests.

For some trips the guests were scattered among several houses for hospitality and in one instance the Assistant Field Director thought the boys might by shy; on the contrary they chattered so much their hosts found it hard to get a word in edgeways!
