NEWSLETTER No. 18

This is my last message to you as Chairman of the Association for, as you know, it is now laid down in our Constitution that a Chairman, although elected annually, may not hold office for more than three consecutive years and I have served in this capacity for ten. As requested in the November Newsletter, nominations for Chairman and for the Committee had to reach us by April 1st. The list of the nominations are being sent with this Newsletter; voting will take place at the Annual General Meeting on June 16th.

The first ten years of any organisation are important; they give time for a true assessment of its value both to its membership and to society as a whole and whether it is built on a sound foundation constitutionally. To me, they have been a very exciting ten years as we have watched the gradual growth of the Association from its initial 26 members to something over 2,000 with Area Representatives in nearly all the Areas and an increasing number of County Groups. We have recently issued "Notes for Guidance of Area and County Representatives" to help them in the expansion of their activities. Our President, Mrs. Shenfield, is asking Area Organisers to regard the Association as a continuing step in a WRVS members' service, when she gives up a more active role. I know this will be the aim in all county development and I hope that this idea of continuity of service will be a great strength to WRVS. We may not be able to give operational service but we can give encouragement and backing

to our local WRVS activities and we all, everyone of us, are in touch with friends, nieces and nephews and their relatives, who might be potential members of the Service. Let us try to keep ourselves and them informed on what WRVS is doing and what it could do, not only in an emergency but in the day-to-day work of giving support to the social services.

Subscriptions - We are grateful to those members who followed the instructions in the last Newsletter and sent in their subscriptions before and during January. Many are still coming in, but if there are any members who have not forwarded their subscriptions, normally due in the first half of the year, we will be glad to have them as soon as possible.

Annual General Meeting - With this Newsletter are full details of the arrangements for this year's Annual General Meeting in Birmingham. We have a delightful hall, Birmingham members are doing all they can to make it a happy day and we hope that there will be a record attendance. I realise that many who may have come regularly to our AGMs in London may not be able to get to Birmingham, but do remember that many members living in and around the Midlands and elsewhere in the country have never been able to get to London meetings. By having this annual gathering in different parts of the country we will gradually give an opportunity to different geographical sections of our membership to attend an AGM. I hope that those who can reach Birmingham will be planning ways and means of being with us on June 16th through car sharing, hiring of coaches or use of their rail cards.

The members living in the London Area have been holding an annual gathering in October for the last few years and it is hoped that it may be possible for members within easy reach of London to be invited to the London Meeting when it is held later in the year. Members from Areas outside London who are interested should write to the Hon. Secretary of the Association at Headquarters who will send them details as soon as a date has been fixed.

WRVS AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE, LONDON - 11th November 1982

The WVS/WRVS Association was afforded the privilege of nominating one of its members to attend a WRVS Meeting and Reception held in St. James's Palace on Thursday, 11th November, when the highlight was the presence of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother.

Approximately 300 WRVS members from England, Scotland and Wales assembled early in the afternoon in the Picture Gallery, where they were addressed by our Chairman, Mrs. Barbara Shenfield and The Rt. Hon. William Whitelaw, CH., MP., the Home Secretary, who was accompanied by Mr. Tim Raison, MP., Minister of State at the Home Office.

Space does not allow for a full report but it was good to hear from Mrs. Shenfield that 1982, which she had suggested should be designated "WRVS Year" has been successful in achieving its two-fold purpose, namely - to inform more people of the WRVS services they might wish to use for themselves or to help others, and also to interest more men and women in becoming members.

She said that at times like the present when it was all too easy for people to become discouraged, voluntary services provided an opportunity for every citizen, through friendship, neighbourliness and concern for others, to participate in the process of improving the quality of life in the community, especially as it affects the vulnerable and the disabled.

During his address, the Home Secretary stated that, although he did not undervalue the original and prime role of WRVS in providing a service for emergencies, he considered the wide-ranging nature of our Service should be better known. In commenting on the help WRVS had given to people displaced from their homes in the Falkland Islands, he said this had extended as far afield as the Isle of Mull, Lincoln, Southampton and Portsmouth. Everywhere WRVS members had met the urgent and longer-term needs, as they had also done for the families of men away in the Task Force.

He mentioned how so many services had grown naturally out of existing ones and cited examples of social transport, family support and the welfare of offenders and their families.

After a short adjournment, members were conducted by stewards, resplendent in orange tabards, into three other reception rooms, the Throne Room, Entree Room and Queen Anne Room. The Queen Mother, looking as charming and elegant as ever, in a most attractive turquoise velvet outfit and wearing her WRVS badge, moved among the assembled guests, talking not only to those who had the honour of being presented to her (including our Association representative) but to very many others who had travelled from all over the U.K. After taking tea with our Chairman and six selected members, Her Majesty left us; we made our several ways home - everyone agreeing that it had been a most memorable day for all present.

WRVS MAGAZINE

The first edition of a new WRVS magazine has now been published and was distributed in mid-March as a free issue as widely as possible.

It is planned that in addition to news of WRVS, profiles on some aspects of the work, people and places, events in the areas, stories from the past, articles of general interest, etc., etc., there will be a number of advertisements as well as space for "small ads".

There will be three issues a year - Summer, Autumn and Spring - at the cost of £1.95 including postage.

WRVS HOME DEFENCE COMMITMENT

Members may be interested in the following paragraph which has been circulated to WRVS throughout the country:

"WRVS has throughout its existence always undertaken to train and provide members ready to work in any kind of emergency, personal, local or national. As a part of this commitment members are trained in such methods of Home Defence as the Government, in the light of advice currently available to them, believe could be useful in the event of hostilities, conventional or nuclear. This readiness to serve the community in an emergency is the normal role of the WRVS".

LONG SERVICE CERTIFICATE

There is now available in WRVS a Long Service Certificate for either members who have completed the required 40 duties a year for at least 10 years (but will not be able to work for 15 years to gain the Long Service Medal) or for members who have completed at least 15 years service with a minimum of 20 duties a year.

THE WRVS BENEVOLENT TRUST

As suggested at the last AGM the WVS/WRVS Association Committee sent a cheque for £250 to the WRVS Benevolent Trust in recognition of all the help given us by WRVS Headquarters. On the 24th November there was held a Bring & Buy Sale in aid of the Trust. The Conference room at Headquarters looked more like the opening day of a Harrods' Sale, so packed was it with bargains and a host of shoppers, among whom we were pleased to see a number of Association members. Thanks to the generosity of both donors and purchasers, the splendid sum of £750 was raised. The sale of the Tea Towels (all sold out before Christmas) and numerous donations has greatly helped the Trust to meet likely requests in 1983.

WRVS LAWN TENNIS TOURNAMENT

The annual Tournament will take place on the hard courts at Wimbledon, by kind permission of the All England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club, on Tuesday and Wednesday, 6th and 7th September 1983. NEWS FROM AREAS

LONDON South East. Mrs. G. Block has so far found only 27 members in her area but she has been in touch with them all and the six Borough Organisers asking for their co-operation in recruiting new members from those "retired" with whom they are in contact. Their first "Get Together" since the reorganisation in London was held in Bromley in April - a "Bring your own Lunch" occasion.

North East. We welcome the appointment of Miss Doris Wright as Representative for this Area of London.

North West. Mrs. Mary Julian, who had been an elected member of the Association Committee, has now been appointed the Area Representative for the North West of London. She reports that their membership is now 79 and that a number attended a North West Area Day at Brent Town Hall. 250 WRVS members in all, drawn from the seven London Boroughs, gathered to meet the Chairman and each other. The Chairman's inspiring address was followed by a "fun" session - a comical fashion parade organised by the clothing stores, illustrating the varied and unusual garments given to WRVS - from the briefest beachwear to glamorous evening dresses, including cowboy outfits and ethnic fashions and finishing with the traditional bridal party - even the bride's mum was there, weeping tears under her huge picture hat.

NORTH WEST DIVISION- Area 1, Cumbria and Lancashire. Mrs. A. Spibey held a meeting of members in her own home; she says that the Association in this large Area is moving very slowly in spite of the excellent co-operation she receives from the Area and County Organisers. Once again she was invited to an Area meeting held in Lancaster and is to visit County meetings to enlist the help of the District Organisers.

Area 2, Greater Manchester. Mrs. M. Head has, since becoming the Area Representative, contacted all 23 members. A reunion held at a Day Centre in Altrincham in December was attended by both Area and the Trafford Organisers. It is hoped that the 2 or 3 Area Newsletters a year sent to all members will help to recruit.

Area 4, Cheshire and Merseyside. Mrs. Mary Preston gives the news that the number of Association members continues to grow and has now reached 69. Having held their Annual Area Reunion in Chester and Southport in 1981 and 1982, this year's meeting was in Northwich in April.

NORTH EAST DIVISION - Area 1, Northumbria. In spite of being "in the throes of moving after 45 years" Mrs. C.V. Smurthwaite reports: "We are doing our best to develop the Association in this widespread area along the right lines so that it will achieve our aim of a close integration of all our members. We are fortunate in having an efficient Secretary and Treasurer at Area and the membership is growing steadily.

A Bring and Buy held in November was supported by over 100 people - a rewarding result for our first effort. An Area Christmas Lunch was followed by a demonstration of making chocolates and an interesting film of the History of WVS/WRVS. The excellent buffet meal was all home-cooked by members.

Each local area has its own celebrations and is proving how much these groups are needed by our older members.

At our first 1983 Area meeting of Local Representatives we discussed future plans which we hope will include a visit to a place of interest not too far away!

The second 'Northumbria Newsletter' will be in print as soon as possible."

To supplement the above reference to Local areas, we read in a Narrative Report from Wansbeck District that "WVS/WRVS" is flourishing and we have had interesting meetings under the Chairmanship of Mrs. Mary Pratt. These included an account with slides by the Rev. Bunker on an Indian wedding and a talk by Mr. and Mrs. Hetherington on Fauberge eggs, illustrated by a marvellous display.

The same report refers to a proposed new group in Newbiggin.

Area 3, North and South Humberside and Lincolnshire. Mrs. Dorothy Stokes is aiming to find Association Representatives for the Counties, when she hopes she will have a progress report to make.

Area 4, South and West Yorkshire. We are delighted to welcome Mrs. Helena Foster (Lately Area Organiser) as our Area Representative for this part of the North East and congratulate her on having sent some "news". She hopes that with the support of the new Area Organiser, Mrs. Jacqueline Wynne-Jones, she will be able to resuscitate and increase membership. Their nine closely-linked Metropolitan Districts, comprising some 3½ million people, are always busy but still find time to look after their retired members. A Reunion was held in April to discuss future activities. The Editor looks forward to receiving an account in due course.

MIDLANDS DIVISION, Area 1, West Midlands Counties - Warwickshire.

Mrs. K. Fensom, the County Representative for Warwickshire, reports on a pre-Christmas "Get Together" and Lunch held in late November. Mrs. Rose, the County Organiser, spoke about current work and Mrs. Olive Wright, the Area Representative, gave the members details of an Association Work Party she had attended at WRVS Headquarters.

Area 3, West Midlands Metropolitan County. Mrs. E. Kenrick thanks Mrs. Wortley for "looking after the Area" in her absence, following a hip operation, and for organising the winter activities, which included a Coffee Morning held in November and a Lunch at the College of Food and Domestic Arts, attended by 25 members. Plans for the Summer were discussed at a coffee morning in February, the first event being a School of Music performance of Carmen.

Solihull has held two meetings in the last six months, the first in the WRVS Office and another - attended by 28 members in a member's house when several more joined. Future plans are to hold three or four lunch meetings a year with occasional speakers.

HOME COUNTIES

ANGLIA DIVISION, Area 1, Home Counties. In the absence of an appointed Area Representative, Mrs. E. Woods, the Area Organiser, very kindly sent the following:

Hertfordshire continues to have an annual garden meeting 'hopefully when the sun shines'

Northamptonshire. A new branch is being formed and has recruited its first 9 members. The County Organiser is doing all she can to help.

Cambridgeshire members have met five times in the last year - twice in Huntingdon, firstly for a Bring and Buy to raise funds for postage, etc., and in the autumn, a Wine and Cheese Party followed by a film show of the Fen Country. They had a pleasant summer afternoon garden party and a visit to Wimpole Hall which had belonged to Rudyard Kipling's daughter; it had been a military hospital during the war and is now restored to its old beauty and charm.

SOUTH EAST DIVISION, Area South East, Surrey, Woking. Mrs. E. Spiers our County Representative, and a member of our Committee, gave us a copy of the invitation and agenda sent to the 32 members of the Woking Group for their 2nd Annual General Meeting, which was held in February this year in the Nurses' Social Centre, Woking. From this we see that the Group is being run on "business lines" with an elected Committee and sub-Committee, covering various aspects of their activities. The result has been an interesting and full programme; in addition to those reported in our 1982 Newsletters, a well-attended Luncheon was held in the autumn.

It was most encouraging also to read in a Woking Narrative Report last year that "The WVS/WRVS Association is proving successful and the District Organiser feels that she now has something to offer retiring members so that they will still feel a part of WRVS. The Association should be a great help in the welfare of older members".

WALES - From Mrs. K. Mowat, Representative for Wales.

South and Mid Glamorgan. 26 members went to Wales Headquarters in November to attend the presentation of a framed photograph of Miss Sylvia Vachell, a much-loved and respected former Administrator for Wales. Mrs. Cecille Stampa, Chairman Wales, welcomed all present including Mrs. Franklyn Williams, a past Administrator, and other former staff members.

Mid Glamorgan has a new leader, Mrs. L.B. Smart- their inaugural meeting was held in March.

Wrexham Maelor had a "special" tea party in February in the District Office; members hope to organise transport for the Association's AGM Reunion in June.

SCOTLAND - FROM SCOTLAND'S INFORMATION SHEET JANUARY 1983.

Headquarters and Lothian Regions - 45 members attended a coffee morning held at Scottish Headquarters in October 1982. The Hon. Mrs. Corsar, Chairman Scotland, gave a short talk which included an account of her visit to Highland North where she met members from Sutherland and Caithness.
