A TREAT IN STORE!

<u>Miss Kathleen Halpin CBE</u> our Founder Chairman has graciously consented to undertake the mammoth task of writing a treatise on "THE HISTORY OF THE WVS/WRVS ASSOCIATION" in time for publication in the November issue - and for posterity.

WRVS RESIDENTIAL CARE CLUBS

We continue to extend our programme of care for the elderly as and when we can and as the need arises.

We have Care Clubs for the elderly "in need of care and attention": that is, those who are unable to live alone any longer, throughout England - though most are situated in the south of the country. Anyone who wishes to know more about the management of the Clubs, their costs, situation and vacancies should contact the writer at WRVS Headquarters.

Most of the Clubs are older type buildings adapted to suit the needs of a Club for elderly residents; some are at the seaside, some in villages or small towns and a couple actually in the Greater London Area. Charges are modest because of the voluntary effort which is put into them and as a rule of thumb guide charges are about a half to two-thirds of what is asked for self payers in Local Authority Homes. No Club has large numbers and the idea we hold on to is to ensure that they have a "Hotel" atmosphere rather than a "Home" atmosphere though it should be emphasised that they are residential care clubs and have to come within the Residential Care Home Act 1984 in order to operate.

When last I wrote about Residential Clubs it was to say that we were opening one in Swanage. This has flourished and is most successful. Our more recent work has been in putting up extensions and in renovating and refurbishing. Perhaps our most exciting project at the moment is in Devon where we are purchasing a lovely old hotel in Sidmouth. This will be a well-equipped home and will enable us to look after several more residents.

We encourage people (men and women both) who come to bring some small items of furniture with them to keep up the home from home feeling but we do have to keep a firm hand on what is brought in otherwise too much furniture can be put into too small a space and clutter and danger can arise.

Each Club is run by a local voluntary Management Committee headed by a local voluntary Chairman who is usually a WRVS member. A resident Warden and Deputy are employed as are Care Staff, cooks, domestics and gardeners if necessary.

Before an applicant can become a resident we need to be sure they will be happy at the Club and will fit in. (This is most essential as a new resident has probably sold his/her own house and is expecting to stay at a Residential Club for as long as possible and, hopefully, for the rest of his/her life). In order to ensure this we normally have the applicant come and stay in the Club for 2-4 weeks. We need to be sure they are in reasonable health and so need a medical certificate and a couple of references as to their ability to pay and their personality. If a resident is unable to pay the full fees from their own resources, it is possible to get help from Social Security.

We are not able to give nursing care and if a resident becomes in need of this type of help, then he or she would have to go elsewhere but this is explained fully before residence is taken.

Anyone can apply to come into one of our Clubs. We do not give special facilities to WRVS members because the Clubs are for the community at large. If, however, you know of anyone who might care to have more details then please - just ask.

> 3,000 knitted vests from three Counties, plus another 300 now awaiting collection. STOP PRESS: A further 800 garments collected 21st January 1985.

Emergency Care for Children in Ethiopia - a scheme sponsored privately by Bristol businessmen, but recognised as a registered charity. This is meant primarily forthe despatch of medical materials to a team of French doctors and nurses working in Ethiopia. There is also a request for blankets, both plain and knitted and, to date, about 30 have been handed over. We now have a further consignment packed in just over a dozen black plastic bags.

Through a scheme organised by students of the Ecclesiastical College in Bristol, Avon County have succeeded in sending to Poland over 1,000 garments for children up to the age of 8years.
