She has always taken great pride in doing things properly, making sure that she has a thorough knowledge of her subject coupled with clear communication - setting herself the very high standard which she encourages in others.

MISS JOSE DUKE MBE

We are, indeed, most grateful to Miss Duke for her very interesting "history" of WRVS Services Welfare Overseas and for the time and thought she has given to the production of a story about which so many of us know so little. Miss Duke joined WVS about 30 years ago and proudly wears her long-service medal and clasp which she received after 27 of those years.

She was awarded her MBE on the recommendation of the Ministry of Defence in 1975, having completed 20 years overseas service, for administration in the Far East and at Headquarters with the M.O.D. for Services Welfare Worldwide, which, at that time, still included a wide variety of overseas postings.

In 1977 Miss Duke had the rare honour of representing WRVS at the Festival of Remembrance at the Albert Hall on the 12th November.

She tells me that of all the medals with which she has been presented, perhaps her favourite "gong" is the Army Campaign Peninsular clasp for the Malay/Borneo "confrontation" of 1963/66. WRVS were entitled to receive these campaign medals when serving in the areas concerned, thus many Services Welfare Members have received them for Cyprus or Kenya or Malaya and/or Aden; others for Korea and a few for the United Nations Medal for service with the UN troops in Cyprus. She modestly says that she is not unique but that she was always pleased to receive one! Some members managed to get two or even three bars/clasps to their medal. By moving from Cyprus to Aden at the right time, or coming from Malaya to Kenya, depending upon where the action happened to be - and Services Welfare was generally to be found there or thereabouts!

She was Administrator for the Far East from 1964-1967 when she became Assistant Administrator and Training Officer at Headquarters until her appointment to the responsible position of WRVS Services Welfare Administrator, which duties she performed with great success and efficiency from 1972 to 1980 - who better, then, to tell us about WRVS Services Welfare Overseas?

WRVS SERVICES WELFARE OVERSEAS

It is not unusual when asked what I used to do, for people to say, "Oh, I didn't know WRVS ever worked overseas". It's a bit sad if it happens to be a fellow WRVS member who expresses the same surprise! We all know WVS started in 1938. What is less well known is that WVS Services Welfare members first went

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overseas on full-time contracts at the beginning of 1944, and that this work continued for 42 years.

Maybe it is because during this year, 1986, the fact that WRVS Services Welfare work with Gurkha families in Hong Kong and Brunei is to cease, with the result that the <u>only</u> overseas posting left will be the one in Belize, that I have been encouraged to write something for the Association News.


Like most WVS work it began by meeting a need. In 1940, after Dunkirk, local WVS began serving tea on railway stations to Servicemen. This quickly developed into running canteens on or near the station, to Town Clubs, where the men could relax, to Mobile Canteens, and Libraries visiting Army Camps, Searchlight Units, Gunsites and Airfields. It was on the strength of this association that in 1943 the Director of Army Welfare invited WVS to co-operate with NAAFI (Navy, Army and Airforce Institute) by providing teams of full-time members to undertake the Welfare and Social Activities in large Leave Centres overseas. So, in Feburary 1944, the first party of eight WVS left for Algiers and Italy.

In the same year, as an associate member of the Council of Voluntary War Workers (CVWW), WVS was brought into the planning picture for the invasion of Europe and by September were working in the leave centre at the Hotel Ambassador in Paris. Parties followed in November to work in Belgium and by February 1945 the first WVS Mobile Canteens were in operation behind the advancing armies. At the end of that year there were 180 WVS Services Welfare members in North West Europe, many of them in Germany. A WVS/WRVS presence in BAOR was maintained until the end of 1977 with members attached to nearly all the major units including those of the Canadian Land Forces (which served in Europe between 1951 and 1971). The number of members varied, the work varied, and was extended to include Service Families.

In 1945 WVS were asked to go to the Far East, first to Burma, then Singapore, Malaya, Japan and Hong Kong. Mary Gray was the first WVS Administrator in the Far East at this time, later on she will be remembered as a noteworthy and longserving Regional Administrator at home.

During the 50s, 60s and early 70s, WVS/WRVS worked for the Army and Air Force in unit canteens, junior ranks clubs, leave centres and town clubs under NAAFI auspices in many countries, including Korea, Cyprus, Aden, North Africa, Kenya,

Borneo, Iraq, Bahrein, Gan Island, Shargah, and Christmas Island. In fact, wherever there was an Armed Services presence.

An entirely different branch of the work was begun in January 1948 when the British Brigade of Gurkhas was formed in Malaya accompanied by a number of Gurkha wives and families, none of whom had ever left Nepal or India before. In order to help these families sanction was given by the War Office for the employment of nine WVS members (later extended to fifteen) to undertake social welfare with the families and to develop a welfare type organisation covering hygiene, innoculation records, documentation and the liaison between the British Army doctor and the Gurkha midwives and the families besides organising sewing classes, play groups and a variety of social activities and shopping outings. Over the years WRVS served with the Brigade in Malaya, Singapore, Hong Kong, Brunei and Nepal (with the Depot).

This was a job much beloved by those who undertook the work. Many members stayed with the Brigade for long periods, ranging from 10 to 20 and in exceptional cases to about 30 years! One ex-Gurkha WRVS many people will remember was Phyllis Castle, the Warden of the Hans Place Conference House.

Over the years countless numbers of Services Welfare members have come and gone, many going on to other things, others into other WVS work - Peggy Conway for years Head of Prisons Department, Nora Boning, one-time Head of Old Peoples Department, and I will get into trouble for not naming them all and many others. Not unnaturally many overseas Members came home to work in the Army Apprentice Colleges and Junior Leaders Regiments added to the Services Welfare commitment in 1954. This work continues, as does that for the limited number of Regular Army Units in the UK sanctioned in 1971, both financed by M.O.D. as is that final, isolated overseas posting in Belize. This is a 6 to 9 month posting only - fairly basic conditions, poor climate, twice weekly helicopter flights into the jungle to deliver reading material and shopping to the soldiers, and collect flower orders for those left at home, besides running a Club at the base in Air Port Camp. How many old Services Welfare members are experiencing a pang of nostalgia? Even And, Yes. I'm happy to say she DID meet the Queen envy? during her visit last year.

THE EDITOR'S MAILBAG .

Memories of a Member of the WVS in the British Raj in India during World War II. By Mrs Eva Bowen KIH.

I was fortunate enough to have lived in India during the last three decades of the British Raj. My father had been posted to India in the Military Engineering Services and the family joined him there in 1912. It was in Central India where I met and married my husband and raised my family until the departure of the British in 1948.

I was a member of the WVS (India) in Rawalpindi from 1940 until 1948 Initially we joined in with the Red Cross and St Johns by helping to make medical dressings and clothes for hospitals until the forma! formation of the WVS - '940 We were located in a scrap depot and our start up was with the help of the Camel Corps Regiment. We collected bottles, pots, pans and anything else that could be recycled to help the war effort. The scrap business grew rapidly and soon became too large an interprise for the ladies to handle - it was therefore taken a er by the Army. No sooner had we handed over the scrap depot when I was asked to organise and run a canteen on the platform of Rawalpindi railway station. This canteen was set up to provide free refreshments for British and Indian troops, together with some Americans, who were in transit in troop trains (often to and from Burma). The canteen was set up under the aegis of Army Welfare and having been opened by General Noyes was named the "Noyes Canteen" The canteen also received a generous monthly sum of money from Mr Dalip Singh who had donated many thousands of rupees towards the war effort. Mrs Cuthbert-King, the wife of the Commissioner, was our local President and I was assisted by sixteen WVS ladies who worked tirelessly in shifts so that all departures and arrivals of troop trains were catered for

As soon as the Noyes Canteen was functioning efficiently and to full capacity I was asked to take on the additional task of Lady Superintendent of the Rawalpindi Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and WAC (1) Club for Corporals and below. The SAW Club, as it was known, was run on a non-profit making basis with the help of a dedicated group of about forty WVS ladies who worked one shift each per week. We also had the help of two soldiers who were on loan to us (being medically unfit for active service). One was allocated to looking after the dining room and kitchen and the other to handling the bar. My husband, who was on the staff of the Chief Engineer Northern Army Headquarters, undertook the duties of Club Secretary in his spare time.

The SAW Club was indeed a tremendous success. The Club provided cheap and wholesome meals in a relaxed and friendly atmosphere, so many miles from home. Dances were run every Thursday evening and my husband used to go out with two larries to callect the ladies who had volunteered to attend the dances. He would then safely take home these ladies, which incidentally included Elspeth Gray, her sister Ronda and my daughter Evelyn. From time to time we also made arrangements for ENSA parties at the club and these were always popular.

At the end of the war our numbers naturally began to fall and 1 was asked to take on the Officers Leave Hostel as well. I ran this hostel for a further seven months or so until the point in time when I had to close it, the SAW Club and the Noyes Canteen. I was awarded, in the New Year's Honours List after the war, with the Kaiser 1. Hind (K.I.H.) for services in the war effort with the WVS (India). There were many others in the WVS (I) who were also rewarded and many others who richly deserved similar recognition but did not receive it.

After the war India was granted its independence and was partitioned into Parkistan and India. Prior to independence political upheavals had occurred and there had been much anti-British feeling and this, coupled with sectarian disorder, created a situation where the country was beginning to tear itself apart before It had even secured its independence. The result was riot and the mass migration of Hindus to India and Moslems from India to Pakistan. The refugee problem became acute, made the worse by the injuries and savage woundings and killings which arose from the sectarian closhes. Inevitably Army Welfare came under pressure and once again the ladies of the WVS, the Red Cross and St. Johns were drafted in to help. I became involved in a large tented refugee camp, which had one Indian lady doctor, one ex-Army nursing sister and a number of lady volunteers. After a few weeks we were able to move into an ex-Army hutted camp at thasanabdul which did at least provide the basic water and sanitation needs. It was at this camp that I was congratulated personally by Lady Mountbatten on the award of the K.I.H. Lady Mountbatten was the President of the WVS, the Red Cross and St. Johns and this enabled us all to work and pull together with the vast refugee task which faced us all. With the final advent of Independence in 1948 we all had to hand over our responsibilites and so ended the British Raj in India. My husband and I then returned to the U.K. In 1949 my husband was invited back to Pakistan to take up an appointment of Chief Engineer (Air) to the Pakistan Airforce. This appointment lasted for five years and with my knowledge of the language and previous experience during the war It wasn't long before I became involved in the welfare of Pakistan Airforce families. I also helped the World Health Organisation with their TB immunisation in Pakistan.

1 am now 78 years of age, am a member of the WRVS, Fleet, and continue, as I have done for the past twenty years, to befriend and visit an elderly and hospitalised lady. I also work in the local Oxfam shop on Saturdays. I have to say that it has been an interesting, varied and very rewarding life and I hope that my brief article will in some way encourage the younger members of the WRVS to realise that their work is really worthwhile.

for 1986 and thank you for the copy of the Association News which I found most interesting. Was especially interested in the news about the West Sussex Association. I have been a member since it was first started, not been informed about local meetings. 1 joined Worthing Centre 20 odd years ago, visiting, Books on Wheels, Meals on Wheels and reception desk. Now, because of my age I'm only visiting two blind ladies.

I lived in Egremont, Cheshire, during the war, joined WVS in 1940, had a Centre at the Baptist Church Hall, was Secretary of a street National Savings group and helped with whatever needed doing. Met Lady Reading many times - she was very kind and helpful and usually came to see us after a very bad night (bombs). A Mrs Grant was our Organiser then. I had to leave WVS soon after the war due to domestic difficulties but after I retired from paid work in Worthing I joined WVS and have enjoyed my 20 odd years with them, made nice friends who have helped me to make a new life and I hope I have done a little good in this troubled world of ours.

I am sorry I am not able to attend the AGM too far for me to travel.

P.S. Please excuse poor writing - I am losing my sight but still have a lot to be thankful for.

From Folkestone, Dodo Butler writes to say that she was interested to read about the Services Welfare Reunion as she was also in Hong Kong at that time (30 years ago) and in recent years. I'm sure Dodo will be most interested in Jose Duke's "history" of Services Welfore in this issue in which she played such an impressive role. EDITOR

Miss Mary Dyott was one of eight hand-picked WVS members who formed the very first contingent sent to Italy in the early part of 1943 under a scheme arranged by Lady Reading at the request of the Chairman of NAAFI. The American soldiers were being well cared for by the American Red Cross but the British Army had nothing.

Unfortunately, Miss Dyott's story reached me too late for inclusion in the May 1986 edition, in fact we were over-subscribed. Every attempt will be made to incorporate this saga in a later issue but I would like to mention it here, though briefly, to complement the other contributions on WVS/WRVS service abroad during and after World War II.

After a traumatic week in London during the height of the blitz, these heroic ladies travelled to Liverpool to board the S.S. Ormond which sailed as part of a convoy of 25 ships guarded by destroyers, a flotilla and aircraft carrier which landed them sofely in Algiers where they were injected against typhus, etc. Two members of the team remained in Algiers whilst others were sent to Naples, to Bari, where they were visited by Miss Mary Cray on Lady Reading's instructions. Some then went to Egypt and to Forli in Italy where Mussolini was born, to Vienna and to the Far East. Miss Dyott ends by saying that the whole world owes a deep debt of gratitude to our Founder Chairman, Lady Reading. So I'm sure all our members will look forward to reading her story in full at a later date - it is full of incidents.

I have just received my first copy of our magazine. As you are surely aware we have just joined a new branch in Bolton and we were very pleased to meet together again. I am very proud to wear my mother's WVS badge as well as my own WRVS one.

I had two toddlers during the war when mother was helping the WVS Branch at Famworth with evacuees, blitzes in Manchester and Liverpool, knitting, etc. I used to go to sell stamps etc., and give wool out for knitting but couldn't do more then.

When I retired I started at once to Bolton & District General Hospital in the geriatric and psychiatric wards and shop. I can honestly say that I enjoyed every minute of it and was very upset when the doctor said, "no more".

Six WRVS lodies used to do a full day every Thursday and we manned the shop five days a week as well. We made some really good friends with both staff and patients and I still go up to see them when I can. I am so glad that a Branch has been started up at Bolton and looking foward to our next meeting.

Hope you have been able to read this as I have arthritis and the pen just goes where it wants and to think that I was School Secretary for 17 years. Ah, well!

WORLD WAR II. From Mrs Peggy Otter

I only realised the seriousness of the situation when a friend in Cambridge asked me to join her in assembling civilian gas masks at a local school. This was at the time of the Munich crisis. We had to attach the small canisters to the rubber face masks and finished just as It was getting light. After this we signed on at Police Headquarters to join A.R.P. and later made our base at Cherryhinton School where we learnt some First Aid and drove a laundry van fitted with 2 stretchers. Sometimes we drive in the dark, wearing gas masks, which was not easy. Nothing really happened but when there was an alert we had to bicycle to the depot in the dark, so kept a jersey and siren suit handy always. It is surprising how much one can see when there are no lights. We had become WVS by then. We were drilled and marched up and down the Guildhall by an ex-soldier!

When my husband, who was in the RNVR, went to Dover, I holped in the Comforts Depot run by Lady Ramsay, wife of the Admiral. This was not WVS work. During Dunkirk evacuation a great many of the wounded were too ill to travel further. The local WVS sent me to take names and addresses of the men at the hospital but it was not easy to get the details and I ended up helping the very few nurses on night duty.

We were still in Dover during the "Battle of Britain" and later during some of the shelling but after my daughter was born I returned to Cambridge and occasionally helped in WVS canteens. The Poles were so polite and pleasant in the Jesus Lane conteen. We had to remember to fill mugs with milk to go sour when we went off duty as the soldiers liked this. At the railway station canteen we were really busy when trains come in and we cooked eggs and bacon for the early trains, as we slept at the station during the three or four quiet hours. The "ladies" who come down from London often missed the lost train so we made them help us in the morning rush.

THIS IS NOT WVS but at the beginning of the war my mother suddenly had 11 boys aged 10 sent to her as there were rooms over the stables in Newmarket. The cook declared she could not cope and left so I went home to lend a hand. It was not a very satisfactory arrangement as there was no one to supervise the boys (who were very good) but after a few weeks they were all sent to a school nearby.
