CLOTHING

Mrs. K.G Waldram of Grimsby writes "I do not know if this is a suitable story for the News, but it caused a lot of hilarity in the office when it happened.

"A young woman came and asked for clothing as her house had been bombed and she had nothing but what she stood up in. We found sufficient suitable clothing until we came to nightdresses. They certainly were of the useful type which did not appeal to her. We apologized for not having anything more exotic. Her response was "well, I couldn't receive my gentlemen in anything like that, could I?" We had no-one available to give advice on the subject.

A more respectable story was that of an old lady whose house had to be evacuated after a raid. She was going for a period to a Council house "in a nice part, and she must have something decent to hang on the line".

Mrs. Betty Caudwell of Canterbury writes: I joined the W.V.S on its first day when we lived in Oundle. which was a safety area, so it was deemed a suitable place for quite a large clothing store, of which I seemed to be in charge. My job was eventually to be continually moving the clothes from one place to another. In the mid-war years we had a wonderful consignment of clothes from Canada, all tied up in bundles of five with the (still, I believe) very special knot. There was everything, including blankets embroidered with the names of our Canadian well-wishers and layettes. Then, from somewhere and somehow, a most charming Dutch lady appeared with transport and took away loads of these Canadian gifts for the sorely stricken people of Holland. I will always remember her amazement and gratitude.

Mrs. Margaret Pepper of Porthcurnow, Penzance, recalls that when she was in charge of the Barnstaple District office one of the regulars came in, who "tried it on" about every two months. The mother looked at the stock, turned to her daughter with a typically hard done expression on her face, and said in a loud voice "Cum orn, Marge, nuffin fer us ere, they aint got their spring stock in yet, we'll cum back when they 'ave". To me she simply said "Tarah mate, we'll manage til you change yer fasshun rail".

<u>Mrs.T. Dunton of Poole</u> One old and regular offender appeared in the local court. The Judge said to him "You look well dressed this time". The man replied "I was rigged out by one of them WVS ladies and I feel a gent". On one occasion a schoolgirl cried because she had been given school uniform and wanted "'igh 'ills and a bra" like her older sister. Of course the latter was produced, all of twenty-six inches. But not the 'igh 'ills! "Working in Clothing is interesting, varied and worth while, because our clients are young and old and of different temperaments".

Mrs W. Peacock of North Shields remembers the hard work entailed in clothing the Vietnamese refugees. Communication was the biggest problem. "They all managed to get in together, from grandparents to babies. It was chaos, but we muddled through as best we could. The following Monday we returned to find all the black sacks emptied, and the 'sorted' clothing all mixed and piled on the floor. The warden calmly announced that it had been raining all week-end, and she thought it would give them something to do! We found out later that they preferred to scavenge....It was very rewarding to meet one family in Newcastle three years later and to be greeted as an old friend."

<u>Gentlemen of the Road</u> These seemed to figure in a number of Clothing stories. Indeed one certain Mr.R.S. has followed me from one office to another during my own WRVS career, swearing faithfully each time that he really will go to Alcholics Anonymous. However here are some happier tales. Ed.

<u>Mrs. Lorna Brotherton</u> reports on two in Wales. One resulted in a nice article in the Wrexham Express entitled "Clothes probably saved the Life of Man". It went on, "It might not be as up to date as Marks and Spencer but when you are over 80 years of age and have been sleeping rough in icy weather for a week somewhere offering a warm change of clothing no matter what style or colour is very welcome....There is no doubt about it - those clothes played a part in his survival of last year's bad winter"

Some gentlemen pop in every year, like Paddy the itinerant, who walked in looking the worse for wear but stepped out in dandy style wearing checked trousers, climbing boots, brilliant white overcoat, tartan scarf, cap and a broad Dublin smile

<u>Mrs. Margaret Pepper</u> of the Exeter office took pity on one gentleman "The smell of him was iniquitous - I remember it well. He was muffled up in scarf and raincoat etc. I put him in a corner and said 'take your things off and I'll measure you' I went on doing what I had to do, getting items off the shelves. In due course I turned round with my tapemeasure in hand, only to discover that he had taken me literally - he had taken everything off, all except the filthiest of brief T shirts." Eventually he was provided with the necessary items.

Mrs. M. Hawkins of Barnstaple had one very dirty client who arrived with a BEJAM shopping trolley. He was of no fixed abode, wanted sheets, blankets, dressing gown and pyjamas. "We could not refuse him, but did say how was he going to use them? He said he believed in being clean and comfortable. As we had to get the air freshener out when he left the store, we thought that the understatement of the year!"

When Borough Organiser for Haringey, I was in the <u>Tottenham District Office</u> one afternoon when a young man and woman came in. The District Organiser asked them if we could help, and, rather hesitantly, the young man said: "Well, not really. Its just that two years ago Probation sent me to this office for clothing when I was released from prison. Its the first time I've been back in this area, and I wanted to let you know that I've gone straight ever since, and I wanted you to meet my wife". Exactly how the conversation continued I do not remember. We were, I suppose, covered with confusion. But it is, I think, a rather satisfying note on which to end this section of our Archives. Mrs. Smith, now 83 years of age, was for many years a MOW Organiser, and was Local Organiser for Beeston between 1975 and 1980. She has continued to help WRVS and local charities.

<u>Mrs. Claydon</u>, (HC Anglia 3) was asked whether it would be possible for a WVS member in her nineties to move to Ipswich to be near her son. The Ipswich Home said "Most unlikely, we do not take new residents over the age of 80, but let her get in touch". The Happy Ending is that this remarkable lady is now installed in the Ispwich Home, well settled in, and writing grateful, and enormously legible, letters to us all!

<u>Mrs. Grebby</u> (Dorset) tells us that her sister, Delia Johnson, who was living in Bath, was asked to organise a WVS Toy Factory as her war work. She was given the use of a shop to make and display toys needed by the War Nurseries and Hospitals, Staff were inexperienced, and materials were scarce, but they managed to produce really attractive toys. There are no members left in Bath who remember this toyshop. Is there anyone anywhere who does, please?

<u>Mrs. Stamp</u> (Hartlepool) reports that WVS experience can sometimes come to the aid of WRVS. While she was at an Association meeting, the District Organiser for Hartlepool had a phone call from a local chocolate manufacturer who wished to offer some of his products to the town. One of the Association members present suggested the Local Authority school holiday play scheme, who were delighted - the chocolates make lovely prizes for children. WVS/WRVS Association, York Branch, Holiday in N.Wales Mrs. Venables has sent us a report of the York Holiday for 1988, which took them to the Snowdonia National Park Study Centre at Plas Tan y Bwlch, Maentwrog on Monday, 13th. June. The SUN shone almost all the time!

"One of the features of these holidays is the friendliness of everyone in the group. We travelled first to Ness Gardens in the Wirral for lunch beside the Dee Estuary. Continuing our journey, we had a gorgeous tea at the Esplanade Hotel in Llandudno and a walk on the promenade in hot sunshine. At our destination we admired the superb situation, and had a very good dinner followed by a talk from the Principal on the history of the house and the area.

"After a full cooked breakfast, we left for Portmerion, the Italianate village built by the sea. Our coach took us to Portmadoc and the Ffestiniog railway. We had picnic lunch on the train. From Blaenau Ffestiniog we went to the Llechwedd Slate Mines. We toured the mine, (wearing hard hats) and listened to the guide's description of the hard life of the workers and their families at the turn of the century. At the Miner's Arms we were served a real Welsh Tea. After dinner we had a lively lecture and slides on the Castles of Gwynedd.

"The next day we travelled to Penrhyn Castle, once owned by the 'slate millionaire' Lord Penrhyn in Victorian times. It is in lavish bad taste, and a cruel contrast to the homes and lives of the slate workers. We crossed the Menai Straits by Telford's beautiful suspension Bridge to Plas Newydd, the lovely home of the Marquisses of Anglesey, for picnic lunch We crossed back to Bangor, and to a WRVS tea provided by local members. It was good to swap WRVS talk with them, and we left an invitation to York where we would warmly welcome them. After dinner, we were entertained by a 40 strong male voice choir.

"Next morning we left. We travelled to Chirk Castle for lunch and sightseeing, then set off for York via Tatton Hall, Cheshire. It will not be possible to repeat the success of this holiday. The place, the weather, the food and the company were all perfect."
