CHILDREN'S WELFARE ARCHIVES

1939 Pocklington Mrs. M.E. Allison (now of Beverley) tells how she was just married, and joined the WVS in its early stages. "Our first task was to tour the town asking people if they were willing to take in evacuee children. We no sooner completed this task, than the evacuees arrived. Boys from Hymers College, Hull, came to share Pocklington School. They were soon billeted and some have kept up their friends in the town. Recently 30 of them had a Reunion at the school, turning up with gas masks with the original labels, and wearing their old school caps.

When the blitz started, evacuees were very loathe to leave town and often arrived by bus and train at a very late hour. One family of nineteen arrived, from Grandma down to great grandchildren. They wished to stay together, and the only suitable place was a vicarage in a village on a large estate. The bus took them out, but they were soon back at reception as there was no fish and chip shop or public house for miles around! They had to sleep on the school floor, and went home the next day."

Bury. During the war, Mrs. Calcrow had prepared a house for schoolboys evacuated from Jersey. Years later, when she was on holiday, by chance she met a man who said "Do you know Bury? I would love to meet the lady who welcomed us and baked a special cake". Mrs. Calcrow replied: "That was me!"

1958 From "Growing up with a Lady in Green" (with acknowledgments to the "Northumbria" Newsletter). A WVS worthy had a cottage at Wark, and my mother and another local member were asked to take children from a deprived family there for a fortnight's holiday. It emerged that the four children they were to accompany were the issue of a family living in the West End of Newcastle-upon-Tyne. As I recollect, they were kitted out by the Newcastle Clothing Store before delivery. During the wardrobing activity, they made a formidable

attempt to denude the Newcastle office of its wallpaper. As to whether they were given the equivalent of evacuee name tags, I do not know, but they should possibly have been electronically tagged. The country holiday cottage was situated three fields distance from the nearest bus stop. Lighting was afforded by two oil lamps, one of which was demolished by one of the children on the first evening. As to heating, there was none - well, a simple coal-fired stove. At least those two WVS stalwarts didn't have to resort to Civil Defence field cooking. I have it from the highest authority that the children were fed on the best during those two weeks. My suggestions for games and activities turned out to be inappropriate. The children were equally street-wise in the country as in their impoverished environment in the city. Apart from desecrating the War Memorial at Wall, they were found to have pockets full of sweets and chocolates 'acquired' from a well-known store in Hexham following a turbulent visit to the Abbev. Ebullient and vivacious, four youngsters were returned to their normal environment, hopefully having gained something broader and beyond their former experience. The WVS Ladies in green returned to their homes, bedraggled, worn-out and somewhat bemused. Two forlorn husbands greeted them warmly -"I've missed you so much - did you have a nice time? - I haven't had a decent meal for two weeks - what's for supper?"

London About 1976. He was six years old, the middle child of three of a single parent mother - all by different fathers. He had never been away from his mother before. When I collected him at the end of his WRVS Hostess holiday I was a little concerned: he was very quiet and morose. However his hostess said there had been no problems, which was reassuring. On the way home it all came out. He did love his mother: but Their Father had played football with him, and Their Father had taken him to see the frogs in the pond, and he hadn't wanted to go home. He felt somehow that he was being very wicked. I told him he wasn't wicked at all, that was what holidays were all about: one met new people and saw new things, and then

it was lovely when one got home again. So he said he was going to play football for Tottenham and Liverpool when he grew up, and he sang football songs all the way home. His social worker hoped that when he grew up he would remember the holiday, and realise how important Their Father had been to that happy family. Ed.

Right up to date! Mrs. V. Jackman reports that on 28th. June, 1990, some Great Yarmouth Association members assisted at the Royal Norfolk Show where WRVS had a creche. The children could be left for up to two hours to enable parents to enjoy the Show. Toys, pencils, blackboards and a sand pit etc. were provided for the children. Facilities were also available for nappy changing and feeding babies. The Police brought along several lost children. They were privileged with a visit from the Princess Royal who was obviously interested.

OLD PEOPLE'S WELFARE ARCHIVES

Mrs. F. Banks (Mid Area 3.) has been a member of WVS and WRVS from 1938, and has written a very interesting and full account of her career. She writes; "In 1946 I was Deputy to Mrs. A. Groves, who was Old People's Welfare Organiser, and we started the first Darby and Joan Club in Kingstanding. In February 1947, during that terrible winter. we started the second which became the Witton Club. These were the only Clubs at that time for older people, both men and women being welcome. Food and coal were still rationed and we each took some coal so that we could light a fire in the room where we met. We gave up coupons for fruit to make cakes each week for tea. Mrs. Groves left the Witton Club after some months, taking 50 members with her, and opened the Burlington Club. The two are now amalgamated as the Witton & Newtown Club. We arranged outings and holidays, taking as many as 400 people away for a week with some WVS escorts on the coaches. We also started Dinner Clubs quite soon, collecting the meals from a Civic Restaurant nearby, and we are still running a Luncheon Club twice a week at Newtown".

ROUND THE COUNTRY

Members will be glad to know that a Birthday Card has been sent to H.M. the Queen Mother with the best wishes of all Members of the WVS/WRVS Association. The front cover design was a spray of flowers in cornflower blue especially designed and painted by Mrs. Chris Smurthwaite MBE (NE1.)

Congratulations to Mrs. Nan Foot, a member of the Gedling Branch of the Association, who was awarded the First Citizen of the Year award by the Rotary Club of Nottingham North on the 7th. June 1990. This is awarded yearly and was for working unselfishly without reward for the benefit of the Community.

Fifty Years on. The wartime County Organiser for Norfolk, expecting Mrs. Churchill in Norwich to visit the WVS Club for USA Servicemen, received a telephone call late one evening: "This is 10 Downing Street: the Prime Minister insists that his wife must have a rest during her busy day in Norwich. Please arrange for a bed to be made available in a quiet place after lunch". The County Organiser fixed it - in the Mayor's Parlour.

Association Member Mrs A. Hardy joined the WVS in 1939 in Huntingdon, Cambs., when she was Mrs. Thompson. On the death of her husband, she remarried and transferred to Great Yarmouth. Since then she has worked consistently in all departments of WRVS duties. At present she does trolley service in Part 111. accommodation and is a helper at a Day Club.

I think it might be a good idea to start collecting the short biographies of members who have been active in the Service since its beginning, and contributions will be gratefully received! Editor. Jenny MacLennan tells us she has started doing MOW in her Area, and now has contact with six ladies with WVS connections, but as distances are so great they mostly keep in touch by newsletter.
