FUTURE SUBSCRIPTIONS

You will have read in the AGM Minutes which were included with your last Association Newsletter that we have had to consider raising future subscriptions. After a great deal of discussion which took place in November at a meeting of your Committee and Area Representatives it was decided that the Annual Subscription will be increased to £4-00 and the Life Subscription to £20-00 for NEW members as from 1st. October 1992. Renewal of Annual Subscriptions for EXISTING members will not take effect until 1st January 1993.

The entire income of the Association comes only from members' subscriptions and donations. We are sure you will all agree that we have had a very low subscription for the past 18 years, with only a very small rise from £1 to £1-50 about six years ago. We have refrained from making frequent small increases as inflation and our expenses rose. Changing subscriptions costs money in reprinting of Application forms, changing of Bankers' Orders etc. - but we have now reached the stage where our expenditure is exceeding our income and this is impossible housekeeping. We are very fortunate to have the use of our office and equipment at HQ free of charge and our administrative costs are kept to a minimum - but postage and printing, two of our main expenses - have escalated considerably and are beyond our control.

The new subscription, at less than 8p. a week, is still very much lower than that of other Associations and Clubs, and we shall make every effort to keep it at that level for many years.

From Mrs. D. Corner, OBE Jersey. Two of our members, who are excellent needle women, are taking part in the making of Jersey's answer to the Bayeux tapestry. The Island is divided into twelve Parishes, over which presides a Connetable and Centeniers and Vingteniers (voluntary Carers for the Parish). Each Parish is producing a panel in needlework depicting the times of the German occupation of the Island, which when finished will, I gather, adorn the wall of the States, the equivalent of the Houses of Parliament.

From Miss B. Stern NE3 joined WRVS Services Welfare Overseas just after the second world war. "We organised entertainment for the troops in big clubs and small regimental canteens: arranged tours to places of interest: welcomed the arrival by troopship at the docks of young National Servicemen: and waved them goodbye when they sailed for home. We tried to be their "Older sisters" or "Agony Aunts" as they are now called.

Apart from club work, we visited sick or wounded Servicemen in Military Hospitals and acted as disc-jockeys putting out Forces requests over the tannoy system on troopships, or on Forces broadcasting units on dry land. Our living arrangements were as varied as our work: a flat in a Berlin Barracks; a rubber planter's Bungalow in Malaya; a Quonset hut in Korea; a five-storey hotel in Tokyo and a Madam Butterfly house with sliding walls. Some of the sanitary arrangements in the Far East were of the "down the garden path" variety, and water came out of jerricans more often than from taps. Wherever we went, a plentiful supply of magazines was sent to us by WVS at home, for which we were most grateful. They were really appreciated by the servicemen.

The most unusual duty we had was to measure the Korean bride of an Australian soldier for her first western clothes, show her how to wear them, and wave her goodbye as she sailed to join her husband in Australia. I am in touch with eight other ex-WVS Overseas, and would welcome news of others.

From Mrs. M. Simmons BEM How They Did It Then.

In 1946 I was Centre Organiser for Cottingham. I wanted to start a Darby & Joan Club, and we invited the old people in Cottingham to meetings to tell them what we would like to do. (Elderly people in those days never went outside their homes!)

We opened our Club in a small room in the old King Street Rooms in 1947. We had 80 members and also sent out 20 meals on wheels. It was hard work, as the kitchen had to be scrubbed out and all the equipment taken to the WVS office over the Trustee Savings Bank. This meant collection and delivery every time. Mrs. Jones cooked the meat at home, and others had a bucket of potatoes delivered which they peeled ready for the next day.

After 3 years we decided it would be nice to have our own hall. Mrs. Jarvis and I took chairs to stand on to look over Mr. Hartley's wall, where there was a hard tennis court. We asked him if we could buy the land, and he agreed on £600. We called a meeting of seven Village Worthies, who each gave us a £100 interest free loan. Alderman Bisby suggested we should start from scratch, and Counc. Briggs was asked to build a hall for us.

We raised money in every possible way, from selling bricks at 5/- each to fashion shows and whist drives. Local Business men gave us large doors, toilets, windows and the floor. Lady Reading helped us to obtain £1,000 from the King George V1 Fund, and there was a donation from Social Services.

In 1954 four Trustees were appointed to run the financial side, and the Midland Bank Manager became Treasurer. The foundation stone was laid by Mr. B. Clarke, a member of the Club, on 31st. December, 1954, and the hall was handed over to us in May 1955. (a stage was added later.) The Hall was opened by Counc. Mrs. Moring, Chairman of the Council, on 23rd May, 1955. Princess Mary came to visit us later. The D.& J. Club continues to thrive. I still attend the Club myself. A big thank you to everyone who made it all possible!
