By the end of 1970 the building was in need of renovation and it was closed for 2 years. By the 1980s there was a mixture of Touring and In House performances. In 2002 new seats and air conditioning were fitted and 2003 will see more alterations for everyone's comfort. Forthcoming attractions include The Russian Ice Skaters, returning for a 5th visit to the Theatre in February and the 2003 the pantomime will be "Aladdin". Over one hundred schools saw the pantomime Dick Whittington this season. Work is provided for 60 people in the Theatre. Workshops are arranged for 4-7 year olds and 11-15 year olds. The Theatre supports literacy and numeracy in schools, as well as U3A. A W.I.Market is held every Thursday morning. The members enjoyed the talk very much. They also had a lovely lunch prepared by the Cheltenham members.
