This brought back so many happy memories of my time as County Organiser and the marvellous 50th Anniversary Service that was held. In those days we had a very smart turn out of at least a dozen uniformed members on parade and the Emergency Services served tea afterwards. This service reminded Dorothy of friends like Alice Cleland, Ava Christophersen, Mary Gibbons and Sylvia Hatchell and she remembers with pleasure many meetings in London and at Milton Hill. Luckily Bedford has a good Association membership and Dorothy enjoys going to most of the events, which have to fit in with her being involved with other charities as well as her family life. Also in <u>Bedfordshire</u>, Jean Callaway offers a warm welcome to three new members Mrs Pat Ashby, Mabel Benson, Isabel Radford. But very sadly records the death of Mrs Phyllis Gershon who joined in 1974. Phyll was a very busy county councillor up to her death in January. At the Associations last Christmas lunch she was talking of her interest in promoting more research into the treatment of dementia in the elderly. A newspaper cutting handed to Jean at the lunch mentions more than 700,000 people living with dementia in the UK, with 244,000 of them in nursing homes. Another article on the same subject implies that elderly nursing home residents, who were exposed to nine hours of bright daytime lighting, saw their rate of mental decline slow down, by a similar amount to that found with drugs.

Over a century ago a Mr Charles Wade bought the property to store his fantastic 'Collection of Collections' & to redesign the farmyard as a series of 'outdoor rooms,' It was a fascinating meeting with an eccentric mind epitomised for me when I mounted the final stair & was confronted by a unusually high roof space stuffed with a collection of bicycles – penny farthings etc. To the family Motto 'Let Nothing Die' I added one word, I leave you to supply your own.

Finally, members enjoyed the 17th Annual Garden Party at Do and Godfrey Vesey's house. We owe a massive debt of gratitude to the Vesey's who for so long have made us welcome to a lovely garden which is also easily accessible. Knowing that Do enjoys dipping into a poetry anthology to relax & recruit her strength the committee gave her "Shadows of War" an anthology of women poets in the 2nd World War. News reached us from former Div Rep Pat Copping of the passing of Elsie Tytherleigh in January. Bunny, as she was known was 96. She worked tirelessly for WRVS for 38 years joining the Association in 1984 holding meetings once a month with interesting speakers. One of the largest projects that was undertaken in Southend, was the knitting of 1,144 individual five foot scarves which were then stitched together to make a single scarf the length of Southend Pier. This was part of a national WRVS project in 1999 to make the longest scarf in the world and therefore qualify for the Guinness Book of Records.

When the members could no longer travel to the monthly meetings, whether through age or frailty, Bunny used to visit them. She really was a remarkable lady who was awarded the MBE in 2003 and who will be missed by so many who had the privilege and pleasure of knowing her

As mentioned by the Chairman and Editor, there is a lovely contribution from Mrs. Knight of Tring, Hertfordshire, where she recalls memories of her years with WVS \ WRVS. She starts by thanking us for the Association newsletter, which she reads with great interest.

Regarding the questionnaire on WRVS background, I have for sometime intended writing to explain how I joined the service in 1946 and later became a life member. At that time I lived in London, and was a civil servant in the Home Office in Whitehall and was seconded to the WVS 41, Tothill Street, ("Totters" as it was affectionately called). WVS received a government grant and a small number of HQ staff were employed to oversee expenditure including members' claims for mileage, telephone etc!

Meeting Lady Reading, and learning how WVS, helped the community, impressed me, and I joined the Headquarters team. Lady Hillingdon was Deputy Chairman. Kathleen Halpin, Sylvia Thursfield, Averil Russell ran Regional Departments. Margaret Triggs was in charge of Transport. Mrs Tingry who cycled to work every day was Emergency Services. Peggy Morden ran the Services Welfare Overseas – members were recruited and trained to serve with our forces overseas, where they provided welfare "back up". I believe when Peggy retired she moved to Jersey where she became involved in local WRVS

Sada Hider ran the "Say It With Flowers" section - an interflora service for Forces and their families. Miss Wolfe (Home Office) was in charge of accounts. Maudie Jones (HO) was secretary to Lady Reading. Margaret Birks (HO) helped on administration. Other names I recall, and older members may recognise are

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Mrs Creswick Atkinson, Mrs Carroll Marx, Margaret Hamilton, Babs Newell, Clemency Greatorex (Kent) Mary Grey (Birmingham) Merle Houghton (Greater London). Everyone was so friendly and helpful.

Do people remember Women's' Home Industries? A Headquarters scheme that started by supplying members with wool to knit squares for blankets for the needy. Later a designer joined the Department, and original knitting patterns were sold. I bought a waistcoat pattern with tartan front. I chose Buchanan, and it was greatly admired. I recall Lady Reading wearing a knitted two-piece, which she had been wearing on a return flight from USA with great pride she went round every office showing it had not creased during the long journey.

Queen Elizabeth brought the princesses Elizabeth and Margaret on several unofficial visits, and Queen Mary donated some hand worked tapestry chair covers to help fund when Government funding was cut back.

Totters was always a hive of activity. Numerous courses were held for Centre Organisers, members connected with Meals on Wheels, Darby and Joan clubs, Toddlers play groups etc. They came from all parts of the UK some staying over two and three days at a time. I wonder if anyone recalls the "One in Five" scheme, under the organisation of Lady Lucas Tooth? The idea being that one out of every five women should be taught how to deal with an emergency of any type, accidents, terrorist attacks, fires – just anything. Unfortunately people were apathetic and the scheme although a good idea, did not really prosper. (Later used for how to deal with a nuclear catastrophe – Ed)

Every year, the people working in Tothill St. HQ received a diary embossed with their personal initials on the front, and a handwritten message inside from Lady Reading. She would remember personal events, e.g. bereavements, illness, moving house etc and write to the member on a personal basis. Lady Reading was a dedicated, forthright, sincere person. I watched Housewife 49 on TV and was intrigued to see the similarity between the actress who played the Organiser, and Lady R. No doubt she was well rehearsed in the role.

One incident typical of the Chairman happened in 1952 when King George V1 was lying in state in Westminster Hall I believe it was February – bitterly cold, Lady Reading was concerned for the long queue of people waiting to pay their last respects. The queue stretched along the Victoria Embankment over Lambeth Bridge down to St. Thomas' Hospital. She wanted to serve hot drinks. Unfortunately she was refused permission by various Government officials, so she immediately went to the Prime Minister who gave <u>his</u> approval! At 5pm she rallied member at HQ to form a 24-hour rota. The Ministry of Food supplied tea, sugar, dried milk and plastic beakers. My tour of duty was 4am – 6am and when I arrived at Victoria Gardens, the first person I saw was Mrs Tingey in her element chopping logs for the "field oven" for the water to heat.

In 1953 I returned to Home Office duties, but shortly afterwards was thrilled to receive from WVS, tickets for my husband and I to watch the Coronation Day events from the stand immediately opposite Buckingham Palace. In 1958 at Kathleen Halpin's request I was seconded again to HQ I worked in the Regional Department with her and Sylvia and Averil until 1962 when I finally returned to Home Office duties and a move to Hertfordshire.

I was able to join in the celebrations when WVS was granted the Royal Charter, and Lady Reading became Baroness Swanborough of Sussex. I promised that when I finally retired, I would return to WRVS. Lady Charles gave me a wonderful farewell party at her flat, and although Lady Reading was in America at the time she wrote me a letter and enclosed a pair of earrings - which I still treasure.

In 1982 I did finally retire from the Home Office and was delighted to be offered the vacant post of Centre Organiser in Tring. By now HQ had moved finally to Park Lane, and I went there to buy up to date uniform and met up with several of the "old" members. Tring was a small town but we had clothing, meals on wheels, books on wheels and two mobile shops in residential homes. For several years we were kept busy and happy but the town population expanded and we could not attract volunteers. We had no immediate need for hospital canteens. We had a very supportive County Organiser Eleanor McCloud but she moved to Australia, and after ten years HQ decided that in view of diminishing government funding we would have to close the office. As Tring center organiser I went with Eleanor McCloud to a service in Westminster Abbey.... would it have been the 50th. Anniversary?

A sad day but we had a really good send off and money we had accumulated through coffee mornings and a legacy was divided between two local charities. Our offices were taken over by CVS but we are still remembered by many people in the town. The local history society has acquired local premises for memorabilia and I am happy to donate some of our local records, photographs, newspaper cuttings etc.

I have such happy memories of WRVS Days. Each Christmas Mrs de Rothschild (as she was then) donated a beautiful geranium to each office at Tothill Street. I could go on forever. Even now, whenever I visit Stoke Mandeville hospital I always have tea in the WRVS cafeteria.

So in conclusion I hope I have not bored you. Maybe I have helped with some HQ background and perhaps evoked some memories for others

May WRVS continue to flourish.

PART OF THE OBITUARY PAID TO LINDY WOOD BY ALICE CLELAND

Lindy joined WRVS in 1970 in Derbyshire to deliver Meals on Wheels once a month. No-one could have guessed that from this small beginning Lindy would end up being a nationally known and greatly loved volunteer in this organisation of thousands and thousands of members. She delivered Meals on Wheels for 25 years but that was only a small part of her incredible voluntary service.

She found her niche in Emergency Services, a branch of WRVS that helps local authorities and the Police, Fire and Ambulance Services in times of disaster -

fires, train crashes, unexploded WW11 Bombs, floods, whatever. Lindy became a Senior Instructor to teach others how to work in a professional manner to support the community at times of emergency. I first met her in the early 1990s and I have to, admit I was rather frightened of her. We were at the Home Office Training College at Easingwold in Yorkshire, Lindy was an Instructor, and I was a very junior trainee. In those days we wore uniform so there we all were dressed in bottle green, it was a bit like school except that we were mostly aged 40 to 50, we were there for a week and at the end we had an exam. It was a tough course and you couldn't assume you would pass. Lindy was very good at it and trained many people like me over the years. She also trained at the Police National Training College and the Red Cross National Training Centre.

In 1986 she and her husband Jess moved to Southampton and she joined Hampshire WRVS. Her work was full-time now but of course unpaid, and at one time she was commuting daily to London to work in the SE Divisional Office of WRVS.

Over the years she was involved with many events or national importance. In 1983 she organised teams of WRVS members to feed policemen for 3 months during the Miners Strike.

In the 1990s she trained to be part of an Overseas Disaster Team that was on standby to go abroad if needed. A colleague remembers spending many a happy hour with Lindy on manoeuvres with the army in North Wales, deciding how heavy a rucksack they would be able to carry, and then back at Easingwold practising feeding in the field. I think it was probably rather fortunate that the WRVS team was never called on, as members were quite worried about not being able to wear lipstick or find a plug for their hot hair curlers!

After the death of Diana Princess of Wales, Lindy was part of the WRVS team that helped to deal with the enormous amount of flowers and soft toys laid .at Kensington Palace which were then distributed to hospitals and care homes.

She worked at the WRVS feeding station for the lying-in-state of The Queen Mother. She led the WRVS contingent at the Cenotaph on Remembrance Day on at least two occasions. I remember one well. I was one of the contingent of 16 and we stayed the night before at a hotel in Russell Square. Lindy briefed us on what to wear – flat shoes, thick warm tights, WRVS great coats down to our ankles, it would be very cold, no question of thinking of looking good – then the next morning we all turned up for our 6am start dressed as per instructions and there was Lindy looking a million dollars in a short skirt, thin tights and stilettos.

In 2003 she had the honour to represent WRVS at The Royal Albert Hall for the Festival of Remembrance, marching down those steep steps as part of the muster.

She was a leading light at the annual WRVS Carol Concert at The Guards Chapel in London, organising the team of volunteers who acted as ushers at the service and helped at the reception afterwards in the Officers Mess.

In 2000, I founded the Vice Chairman's Committee of WRVS and Lindy joined as a founder member representing Hampshire, the Isle of Wight, Surrey and part of Greater London. This small and prestigious national committee acted as a liaison between WRVS volunteers and the Board of Trustees, the members also being the official face of WRVS in their area Lindy was brilliant in this role of VCC. She had an amazing rapport with grass roots volunteers, probably because she was so hands-on herself. She was adamant that they should be recognised for what they had given for nothing and arranged for long service medal presentations and other thank you events, She served her full term of 6 years in this position and then became a representative for WRVS Association, which is our branch for retired members. She had already received WRVS's Long Service Medal for 15 years service, and a clasp for another 12 years, -and in April this year Jess brought her up to York to receive her second clasp bringing her total up to 39 years.

For most of these years, Lindy was on standby for emergency call-outs 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, only resigning in July this year

WRVS is a bit like a secret society. If you are not in it, you don't really get it. But it brings together people of all different ages and backgrounds and turns them into Friends for Life. This is what Lindy loved so much about WRVS and why we-all loved her so much.

If Lindy had lived, I think her next big thing would have been helping to preserve the WRVS Archives – an amazing national record of the past 71 years. She had already come over with Jess with a carload of her personal papers to deposit at the Archives' temporary home in Devizes. I believe there are more to come. She has also made a CD of her reminiscences of her career. She will be remembered as one of the very special shining stars of WRVS, exactly the sort of person that our founder Lady Reading had in mind when she said, "Service to the community is, the way in which each of us, ordinary human beings, can serve our country, and through our country the world. For it will not be by the genius of the few that posterity will be served but by the faithfulness of the very many.
