LONDON NE & CITY

Eve Sheppard (mentioned in the last issue of the WRVS Association Newsletter) telephoned me recently with the news of the death of Elizabeth Hutchison, who was Deputy London Region Administrator during the time of Ava Christopherson (whose death was also recorded recently). Elizabeth had been an Ambulance Driver during WWII and was also involved in Forces Welfare.

At that time London Regional H.Q. was situated at St. Chad's Street, King's Cross. Training and meetings of London Borough Organisers took place there. The equipment for Emergency Feeding such as urns, boilers, stands etc. were stored at that H.Q. Later on the premises became a Clothing Store for the WRVS.

Eve and I had a trip down Memory Lane and we recalled that WRVS Headquarters were situated in Old Park Lane, Hyde Park. It was a large mansion and had been used as a Military Hospital during WW2. It had a creaking lift with a clanging metal grille door (and the building was believed to be haunted!). The offices of the organisers of all WRVS projects were situated at H.Q. and training and conferences were held there. It was also possible to buy ones uniform there and in the early 80^{1} s a new uniform was designed A number of WRVS members in their smart new apparel appeared on a BBC Evening News Programme in a 'Fashion Parade'. (I recalled that a small proportion of my right leg appeared on the screen on that occasion). The WRVS Headquarters subsequently moved from London to Milton Hill in Oxfordshire.

I recalled various clothing Stores throughout the London Region. Clothing was collected from the tall green boxes situated at various locations and from other sources. On one occasion a client gratefully accepted some expensive monogrammed pyjamas. Gentlemen's underpants were never accepted from donors but such items were purchased with money received from rag and bone merchants for non-usable clothing. I particularly remembered Bow Road and Rochester Row Clothing Stores and the WRVS Clothing Depot at Woolwich presided over by Dotty and Eddie Powell. They were a lovely Couple and are much missed. Not only did Eddie collect and supply Borough clothing stores but at the Woolwich premises clothing was dry cleaned and large quantities were packed for distribution overseas for use in the relief of disasters such as floods, earthquakes etc.

We also recalled the Escorts provided by London Region members for displaced persons who had to flee their countries in times of emergency. London members went to Gatwick Airport to meet people from Asia and later to meet residents of the Falklands at the commencement of the hostilities there. They were met at the Airport and taken to overnight accommodation. Next day they were picked up and taken to railway stations on their way to friends and relations in U.K. On that occasion my arm appeared on TV round the shoulders of an elderly gentleman!

Another type of Escort, not well know/n was that of the escort of children of members of the Armed Forces whose parents were stationed abroad. Members across the U.K. picked up the children from various locations and travelled to St. Pancras Station where there was a special military office. This office dealt with the arrangements for the onward journeys of the children to meet their parents and for their return journeys. The liaison with the military and the escorts were also organised from London Region.

At the other end of the age scale what fun we enjoyed in the running of the Darby and Joan Clubs and organising their parties and coach outings to the seaside. None of these projects could have continued without the dedicated WRVS members and in some case WRVS Association members who may be reading this today. I expect there are many of us who regret the passing of such projects.

With regard to Emergency training, Borough Organisers attended an Emergency Training Session at a military establishment at Easingwold, North Yorkshire, where discussions and lectures took place such as feeding, the provision of clean drinking water and toilet facilities. I remember we treated some water from a pond with a chemical preparation as a test for purity. We drank some and suffered no repercussions.

Until about five years ago London WRVS Association members held their AGM/Reunion at a church hall in Hide Place, Westminster. This ceased as membership declined and some members could not travel. Dorothy Stevens, one of the organisers, died a few years ago. Contact since then has mainly been by way of letters and telephone calls. Except of course through the Newsletter, thanks to our Editor, Paulene

This time we are headed for Suffolk. Naturally, many of our passengers guessed the answer, only to have several red

herrings given to us. We are lucky to have such a knowledge driver, makes our day so much more interesting. He has got to know many of us now as we have the pleasure of him on all our outings. The weather was a little unkind to us, but it was April and we are in the UK. However, our 46 passengers enjoyed another good day out.

16th May and we are off on our travels once more. This time we are visiting Peter Beales Roses of Attleborough. Usually, they have a wonderful display, Unfortunately, due to adverse weather conditions, their prize specimens were stored away ready for the Chelsea Flower Show, to which they exhibit. Gave us time for a coffee and browse of the hundreds of roses they cultivate. We then travelled on to Wymondham, an attractive, historical Norfolk market town with its red roofs and the massive towers of the Abbey church set against green fields of the Tiffey Valley. Like many East Anglian towns Wymondham earned its wealth from wool, but another industry which survived in the town was the making of small wooden objects - spoons for example - some of the streets in Wymondham take their name from this such as Spooner Row. Wymondham has a magnificent, twin tower Abbey, founded in 1107 by William d'Albini and dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary and St Alban, this was later changed to St Mary and St Thomas of Canterbury. When built the church was intended to serve both Benedictine Monks and the parishioners of Wymondham. However, quarrels between the two groups over issues such as bell ringing lead to each faction building their own tower! The parishioners built the great west tower... and the monks built the east tower, which has since become a ruin. At the Dissolution in 1538 Abbey church was granted to the people of Wymondham and a wall was built blocking up the Monks tower. Sir Ninian Cooper designed a great gilded screen, and dedicated it to the young men who had fallen in the First World War. The railway station is still in use. Built in 1845 and on the Norwich to Ely line, the station once employed over 100 staff. The station still links Norwich, London, Cambridge and the Midlands. This award winning station has been restored and there is a railway themed restaurant, called Station Bistro, complete with train carriage seats. The theme is from the film "Brief Encounters" with old photographs and paper cuttings. The station masters lounge/dining room has also been restored to its former glory.

20th June, and once again we are off on another coach outing. Today we visit Snape Maltings and Aldeburgh. Snape Maltings is an old mill partially converted into luxurious residential apartments. The remainder of the building is shops that include some unusual craft stalls, boutique, children's toys, cards and books, and restaurants. The Maltings are adjacent to the river were you are able to take a very pleasant walk. We travel on to Aldeburgh in time for lunch, fish and chips, mainly local caught. Aldeburgh is mainly a fishing town, very quaint. As you walk along the promenade there are the fishermen's huts were they sell their daily catches. As we arrived afternoon, all was sold out. The beach is all shingle. We

did find an Ice Cream parlour, which they make, delicious. Our day was also blessed with beautiful sunshine.

July 4th Once again we are on our travels. Today it is Wisbech Rose Fair. Originally called that as the main displays were roses, this annual event, is no longer just roses. All the towns' churches have a flower festival, with the most beautiful arrangements. The leading themes this year being the Olympic Games and the Royal Jubilee. Although 2012 marks 50 years since the first 'Rose Fair', the big celebrations are being arranged for 2013. A most enjoyable day and with the bonus of beautiful sunshine.
